Rachel Kushner, author of *The Mars Room*, Finalist for the 2018 Booker Prize

Rachel Kushner will read from and discuss her work with the audience in a session moderated by Henry Massie, M.D. She is also the author of *The Flamethrowers*, which was a finalist for the National Book Award and a New York Times Top Five Novel of 2013. Her debut novel, *Telex from Cuba*, was a finalist for the 2008 National Book Award and a New York Times bestseller and Notable Book of the Year. Rachel Kushner has created indelible female characters growing up with harshly limited options. Her latest book focuses on a girl from San Francisco's fog shrouded Sunset District who becomes a dancer at the Mars Room, a strip club on Market Street. She kills a stalker and is sentenced to life in prison for want of a competent attorney. The novel is one of tragic beauty, moral complexity and psychological profundity—centrally germane to child psychiatrists.
